

We are grateful to the Frost Memorial Fund for awarding us \$6,000 for repair of the cemetery's original 19th century receiving vault. The receiving vault is located just through the Route 9 gates to the left. Repairs to take place this spring.



TALES FROM THE UNDERGROUND

Theatre on the Road is scheduled to return this fall with a new cast of characters:

George Saltford (1851-1923) Landscaper and florist who built Rhinebeck's first violet greenhouse catalyzing the commercial violet industry in the Hudson Valley.

Susan Elizabeth Frazier (1864-1924) Thought leader on issues of women's and African American rights and teacher in New York City Public Schools.

Andrew Frazier (1742-1846) African American Revolutionary War Veteran, landowner in Milan, NY and the grandfather of Susan Elizabeth Frazier.

Richard Schell (1810-1879) A U.S. Congressman, Schell was married to the sister of Winston Churchill's grandfather.

Mary Miller (1806-1881) Founder and benefactor of the Starr Institute in Rhinebeck.

Elisha Holdridge (unknown-1874) Drummer boy in 150 Regiment NYSV who went on to serve in both the War of 1812 and the Civil War.

Friends of Rhinebeck Cemetery, Inc. is a not-for-profit organization working to promote and optimize the history, design and ecology of the cemeteries under the Town of Rhinebeck's jurisdiction; Rhinebeck Cemetery on Route 9 and Mill Road, Kirchehoek Cemetery (Wey's Crossing) on Route 9; and Kerk Hof Cemetery in Rhinecliff. Nestled into the natural beauty of the Hudson River Valley, these gems are rich with national, state and local histories, architectural treasures, natural heritage, and remembrances of the dead.

We exist purely for the benefit of these cemeteries, promoting their beauty and legacy by raising money for restoration, conservation and education efforts – things not included in the Town's cemetery budget. Current and future projects for the Rhinebeck Cemetery, in particular, include restoration of the stone walls, preservation of the entry gates, repair of historic grave markers, biannual walking tours, establishment of a memorial tree program in support of a comprehensive green plan, and habitat restoration in the newly formed natural burial ground.
