COMMUNITY PRESERVATION WORKDAY

Saturday, June 1st/Saturday, June 8th (rain date)

All ages are welcome for a full day outdoors to help restore grave markers in Rhinebeck Cemetery. The workshop will be led by Francis Miller, principal conservator of Conserve ART, LLC.

With the first burials dating to 1832, this historic site contains headstones, footstones and monuments that chronicle over a 165 year history of the Town of Rhinebeck; Dutchess County; the State of New York; and, the nation. Please join us to learn more about cemetery history, the grave marker types, various stone types, marker conditions and fundamental, hands-on, preservation measures.

PLANT-A-TREE: GROW AN ARBORETUM

SUSAN ELIZABETH FRAZIER DEDICATION

On Saturday, November 10, 2018 there was a dedication of new gravestone for a remarkable woman, Susan Elizabeth Frazier.

In 1896 Susan became the first black (woman or man) allowed to teach white students in New York City.

In June 1919 as President of the Women's Auxiliary of the "Harlem Hellfighters," she hosted 1,200 people at the Lenox Casino in Harlem. The Harlem Hellfighters were an African-American infantry unit in WWI who spent more time in combat than any other American unit. Despite their courage, sacrifice and dedication to their country, they returned home to face racism and segregation from their fellow countrymen. At the event she received a letter addressed to her personally from former President Theodore Roosevelt and a gift from Roosevelt of a large silk, American flag.

In November 1919, she was the winner of city newspaper "Evening Telegram" contest to send the most popular teachers in New York City to see the battlefields of France; Frazier resisted efforts to stop her from going and resisted efforts to have her sit at segregated dining in Paris.

Upon her death in February, 1924 she receives full military honors at the 369th Regimental Armory. Her coffin is draped with the American Flag, taps are played, and commanding officers deliver powerful eulogies.

Bill Jeffway spearheaded the effort to install this stone on her previously unmarked grave.
